

# PRACTICAL GUIDELINES FOR AN EFFECTIVE CHRISTIAN LIFE Lesson Six: Faith That Passes the Test James 2:21-26

| 1. What is the greatest step of faith you have ever seen someone take?  |
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| 2. Do you think some Christians have a greater capacity for faith than others? If so, why?  |
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| 3. When in your life have you taken a great risk and followed what you believed to be God's will, even though some friends and family felt your decision to be foolish? How did you feel in the mist of that time?  |
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| Justification by Faith  The Greek verb dikaioo ("justified") has two general meanings.  |
| The first pertains to acquittal, that is, to declaring and treating a person as righteous; that is the meaning in relationship to salvation and is the sense in which Paul almost always uses the term.   |
| The second meaning of dikaioo pertains to vindication, or proof of righteousness; it is used in that since a number of times in the New Testament, in relation to God as well as men. It is this second meaning that is in view in this passage. James says that Abraham, whose very faith was a gift of God (Eph. 2:8), was nevertheless justified by works. |

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That seeming contradiction, which has frustrated and confused believers throughout the history of the church, is clarified by understanding thAt justification by faith pertains to a persons standing before God, whereas the justification by works that James speaks of pertains

to a persons standing before other men.



## **Scripture Text**

- 21 Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered Isaac his son on the altar? 22 Do you see that faith was working together with his works, and by works faith was made perfect?
- 23 And the Scripture was fulfilled which says, "Abraham believed God, and it was accounted to him for righteousness. And he was called the friend of God.
- 24 You see then that a man is justified by works, and not by faith only.
- 25 Likewise, was not Rahab the harlot also justified by works when she received the messengers and sent them out another way?
- 26 For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.

### James 2:22

Do you see that faith was working together with his works, and by works faith was made perfect? (John 8:39-41)

#### James 2:23

(Gen. 15:1-6, Romans 4:3-4, 2 Chronicles 20:7)

#### **James 2:24**
